Grand jury subpoenas Erie and five other PA dioceses

The state attorney general's office in September subpoenaed the Diocese of Erie and five other Catholic dioceses in Pennsylvania for documents dating back to 1947 related to the sexual abuse of children by priests and other church employees.

Erie and five other Pennsylvania Catholic dioceses—Allentown, Greensburg, Harrisburg, Pittsburgh and Scranton—were subpoenaed Sept. 1 as part of the grand jury probe into the sexual abuse of children and the handling of those cases by church hierarchy.

The subpoena sweep was an extension of the grand jury investigation last year involving the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown and a Holidaysburg-based order of Franciscans.

"The diocese will cooperate with authorities in this matter," according to a statement released by the Diocese of Erie after the grand jury investigation became public.

The diocese has a zero-tolerance policy for clergy, lay employees and volunteers who engage in misconduct with children. All reports of credible allegations of sexual abuse are sent to the district attorney.

At a 2012 news conference in Erie with Bishop Donald Trautman, then-Erie County District Attorney Brad Fouk said he was satisfied that the Diocese of Erie had provided all files on alleged sexual abuse in the diocese, dating back 40 years.

"It is my understanding that disclosure has been complete," Fouk said at the time. "It is my understanding that the search of the records has been exhaustive as it could possibly be. I believe we asked the right questions. I believe the bishop [Trautman] supplied us with the answers to our questions."

Diocese announces final plan for parishes

In a historic restructuring process announced in late September, the Diocese of Erie has reorganized its parish communities, reducing the number from 116 to 97.

No church buildings were closed in the reorganization, but the number of regular Sunday Masses will be reduced or eliminated in some of the affected parishes, beginning after February 2017.

"What we're trying to do is provide the best possible pastoral care for our people with fewer resources. We have fewer priests now and the demographics are changing," Bishop Lawrence Persico said. "We're hope-

fully seeing in this way to make the parishes more vibrant and welcoming so that people can have a prayerful opportunity to worship."

The final plan announced in three vicariates, or regions, of the diocese Sept. 20-22 calls for two parish models: the stand-alone parish and the partnered parish.

The configurations come after a two-year intensive study of all parishes in the 13-county diocese. Last spring, the bishop announced a preliminary plan for restructuring that was immediately followed by a feedback period in which nearly 2,000 people submitted their responses. Also, each parish was invited to submit an official survey assessing the recommended changes.

According to Bishop Persico, the feedback he received influenced some of his final decisions. Several of his final decisions reflect changes from the preliminary proposal presented last April.

Bishop Persico also met with the diocesan Priest Council, which voted overwhelmingly in favor of the recommended changes.

"Believe me, we had some robust discussions. I remain deeply grateful for the thoughtful insights, the prayerful consideration and the wisdom and counsel provided," Bishop Persico said.

One change from the preliminary proposal was the decision for St. Philip Parish in Crossingville. Parishioners there had questioned the idea of merging with Our Lady of the Lake Parish in Edinboro since the majority of St. Philip parishioners live closer to St. Lawrence Church in Albion.

Upon hearing Sept. 20 that St. Philip would merge into St. Lawrence, several St. Philip parishioners were pleased.

"All things considered, I think this was a reasonable compromise," said John Tautin, a longtime St. Philip parishioner. "St. Philip

■ Pope: Christians must never be 'prophets of gloom'

VATICAN CITY (CNS)—Christians must put their mark on history, transforming the world every day by the joy of proclaiming God's love, Pope Francis said.

"We are not prophets of gloom who take delight in unearthing dangers or deviations," handing down "bitter judgments on our society, on the church, on everything and everyone, polluting the world with our negativity," he told catechists Sept. 25.

Instead, the pope advised that whoever claims to be a Christian must carry joy with them and "go out from themselves to write history."

■ Three Mexican priests murdered within days of each other

MEXICO CITY (CNS)—A priest abducted from his parish residence in the Mexican state of Michoacan has been found dead, the Archdiocese of Morelia confirmed Sept. 25. He was the third priest murdered in Mexico within days of each other.

State prosecutors say Father Jose Alfredo Lopez Guillen, pastor in the community of Janamutato, 240 miles west of Mexico City, died of gunshot wounds shortly after being abducted Sept. 19.

His body was found wrapped in a blanket alongside a highway. A motive for the crime is still uncertain.

The abduction and murder in Michoacan continued a disturbing trend of attacks against priests across Mexico, though Catholic leaders are at a loss to explain the motives, which have included robbery, organized crime activity and possible conflicts with drug cartel leaders.

The Catholic Multimedia Center has documented the murders of 15 Mexican priests in less than four years.

On Sept. 19, two priests were kidnapped and killed in the Mexican state of Veracruz.

Father Alejo Nabor Jimenez Juarez and Father Jose Alfredo Juarez de la Cruz were dragged at gunpoint out of Our Lady of Fatima Parish in Poza Rica, a Gulf Coast oil city consumed by crime in recent years, the Diocese of Papanla confirmed in a statement.

Favorite priest remembered

The Diocese of Erie recently lost one of its finest priests.

Msgr. William Biebel—or "Mons," as we used to call him—was a true example of what it means to be a man of God. I am one of the many people he profoundly influenced.

For me, "Mons" was a symbol of the Catholic faith. As the rector of St. Peter Cathedral in Erie, he was there every step of my life's journey: from preschool, to first reconciliation and communion, to altar serving, to confirmation, to college decisions.

"Mons" made the faith cool. He showed me that real men love God and one another. He had an infectious personality, a genuinely kind disposition, and an unmistakable wit. Every Sunday morning at Mass, he'd greet me with something along the lines of, "Hey, Action Jackson! You must be going to the beach later with all the ladies."

Later in his life, when he was a resident of Saint Mary's Home in Erie, I'd ask him how he liked the place. He'd reply, "It's nice here,

but all these old people are boring."

Aside from his wit, "Mons" exuded a cool, indescribable serenity that few people possess. It's one of his many positive characteristics that I try to emulate. I'm extremely saddened that "Mons" has passed, but he lived, loved and evangelized to the absolute fullest. He profoundly touched my life and many others; he made a difference.

For those of us who knew him well, the best thing we can do to memorialize his life is to live like him. I hope his memory lives on for many years to come.

parishioners are grateful that the diocese listened to our feedback and modified its plan. Now it's just up to St. Lawrence and St. Philip to make it work."

Father Phil Oriole, pastor of St. Lawrence, also lauded the bishop's efforts to consider people's input.

"It's obvious that the diocese paid attention to what was presented and they respected it," Father Oriole said.

As a secondary mission church of St. Lawrence, St. Philip will still be able to celebrate regular Masses at its Crossingville church. Nineteen parishes, however, will no longer organize as separate communities, but will merge into other already existing parishes.

Secondary churches—unless they are designated as missions—will no longer have Sunday Masses, but could be available for weddings, funerals and feast days. According to Bishop Persico, it is up to the parishes to let him know if and when they cannot maintain a secondary church building.

Under the bishop's final plan, some parishes will be stand-alone communities. Others will enter into partnerships, retaining their distinct identity as individual communities while sharing one pastor, one parish council and other resources, but keeping individual finance councils.

Newly partnered parishes, according to Deacon Marty Eisert, who spearheaded the pastoral planning effort, will face chal-

lenges as they begin to coordinate changes in the coming months.

He recommends that parish communities use a diocesan-prepared preparation guide and suggested prayer services, both available at www.ErieRCD.org/planning.htm.

St. Andrew, St. Paul and Sacred Heart parishes, all in Erie, are newly partnered and will have some serious conversations, according

to Sharon Bruno, a member of St. Andrew's parish council. The three parishes will have to learn how to share one pastor and one parish council, but will likely have a permanent deacon appointed to assist with the administration of St. Paul Parish.

"It's complicated," Bruno said. "I'm going to put my seatbelt on for the ride."

Kimberly Richards puts her Catholic upbringing to good use by portraying a Catholic nun in the international theatrical comedy "Late Nite Catechism," scheduled Oct. 13 at Erie's Ambassador Banquet & Conference Center.

For 15 years, Richards has donned a traditional habit as "Sister," a generic name that means something to anyone who attended Catholic schools in the pre-Vatican II era. Produced in New York and created by Vicki Quade and Maripat Donovan, "Late Nite" is set in a catechism classroom in which audience members are the students.

"There is a script and sometimes a loose outline, but I talk to the audience throughout the show. I can tell you, I have never done the same show twice," Richards told *FaithLife* in a telephone interview from her home in the San Francisco Bay area.

A native of Pittsburgh, Richards comes to her role with plenty of cred. She attended Catholic elementary and high schools, and her aunt was a member of the Sisters of the Divine Providence.

"My aunt [Sister Carleen Richards, CDP] died last year and had been in the convent for 62 years," Richards said. "She came to many

of the performances. I think she secretly wanted to get up and do the show."

Besides providing lots of laughs, Richards is happy to take contributions after the show to benefit whatever religious order is sponsoring "Late Nite Catechism." Since 2005, Richards has collected more than \$800,000 for sisters throughout the country and in Canada.

The Oct. 13 show benefits the ministries of the Sisters of Mercy, New York, Pennsylvania, Pacific West Community, and for assistance with care of their elderly and infirm sisters.

Msgr. William E. Biebel

Msgr. Biebel left enduring legacy at St. Peter Cathedral, Prep

Msgr. William E. Biebel, former rector of St. Peter Cathedral Parish in Erie and former assistant headmaster at Cathedral Preparatory School, died Sept. 23 at Saint Vincent Hospital in Erie. He was 79 and in his 54th year of priesthood.

Born in Erie, Nov. 23, 1936, he was a son of the late George and Dorothy (McGregory) Biebel. He attended St. John Elementary School, Erie, and graduated from Cathedral Prep in 1954.

He entered St. Mark Seminary, Erie, and began his studies at Erie's Gannon University. In 1956, he continued his studies at St. Bonaventure University, Olean, N.Y., earning his bachelor's degree in 1958.

Msgr. Biebel completed his formation for the priesthood at the Theological College at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., and was ordained in 1962 to the priesthood for the Diocese of Erie by Bishop Edward P. McManahan. He began his priestly ministry by teaching at Cathedral Prep.

While teaching, he also served as chaplain to the Sisters of Mercy in Erie. By taking summer courses, he obtained his master's degree from Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wis.

In 1969, he was appointed assistant headmaster at Prep, a position he held until 1986. During those years, he served as weekend assistant at St. James Parish, Erie.

In 1986, after a half-year sab-

atical spent in further study at Duquesne University, Pittsburgh. Msgr. Biebel was appointed pastor of St. Joseph Parish, Erie, where he remained until 1994. In 1994, he was appointed rector of St. Peter Cathedral, a position he held until his retirement in 2013.

Msgr. Biebel had a great love for liturgy and possessed bi-ritual faculties, which enabled him to assist at local Byzantine Catholic parishes. He was an avid musician and composer, as well as an accomplished

organist. Besides his parents, he was preceded in death by a sister, Rosemary Balczum. Survivors include a brother, James Biebel, and his wife, Nancy, of Erie; a brother-in-law, Paul J. Balczum, and his wife, Eileen, of Erie; and a nephew, Daniel J. Balczum.

A funeral Mass was held at St. Peter Cathedral on Sept. 26, with Bishop Lawrence Persico officiating. Burial was at Calvary Cemetery.
