

In 1300, Pope Boniface VIII called the first jubilee, also known as a "Holy Year," since it is a time in which God's holiness transforms us.

The Year of Jubilee has a special logo or picture (see front) that represents something. The Jubilee logo has distinct colors and meaning: Red symbolizes love, passion and self-sacrifice, Christ's sacrifice and his boundless love for humanity; Orange expresses joy, vitality, and enthusiasm, the light that illuminates the path of faith; Green is universally recognized as the color of hope, growth, and rebirth, and; Blue symbolizes faith, peace, and tranquility, evoking the sky and spirituality, and inviting contemplation and prayer.
